Annual Statistics

Traumatic injury refers to physical injuries of sudden onset and severity which require immediate medical attention to prevent loss of life or limb. Traumatic injuries are the leading cause of death in Canada for persons under the age of 45. It is estimated that over 90% of all injuries are preventable.

Falls and transport-related mechanisms are the main causes of moderate to severe injury hospitalizations in NHA, followed by all-terrain vehicles.

38% of major injuries occur at home



32% of major injuries occur on the road



23% of all NHA ER Visits are injury-related



Median time to definitive care for NH trauma patient is 11.48 hours



34% of major trauma patients are transferred outside NH to higher levels of care



14% of major trauma cases are adults over the age of 75



4% of major trauma cases are children under the age of 16
